### **Smart Snacks in School are Coming!**

What are Smart Snacks?

Last summer, the USDA published practical, science-based nutrition standards for all foods and beverages sold to students during the school day (outside of the school meals programs). These nutrition standards are called Smart Snacks in School. Smart Snacks will put all foods and beverages sold to students across campus on a level playing field. The standards will make healthier foods and beverages available to students while limiting junk food.

Why are Smart Snacks important?

Healthy, well-nourished students are better learners! Students who consume healthier foods and beverages are more likely to get the nutrients they need to learn, play and grow. Having healthier foods and beverages available contributes to the overall health and well-being of youth. In addition, students around the country are seeing a difference in their school meals, including more fruits, vegetables and whole grains. By providing healthier foods and beverages outside of the cafeteria, we can build on the great strides being made **in** the cafeteria!

#### What do I need to know?

- Smart Snacks will apply all foods and beverages **sold** to students outside of the school meals programs including vending machines, a la carte, school stores, snack carts and in-school fundraising.
- Smart Snacks will be in effect all school day (midnight before to 30 minutes after the end of the school day) across the whole school campus.
- Foods and beverages sold to students **as fundraisers during the school day** will have to meet the Smart Snacks guidelines.
- Non-food fundraisers or fundraisers that include only foods and beverages that meet the standards are **not** limited in any way!
- Smart Snacks will not apply to foods served, such as classroom celebrations and during evening, weekend or community events.
- Smart Snacks go into effect on July 1, 2014.

What will the changes look like?

Cookies, candy, chips, donuts and soda will be replaced with items like nuts or seeds, popcorn, baked chips, fruit cups and plain water.

### **Creighton Community Schools**

On February 24<sup>th</sup>, Mrs. Mackey, Mrs. Hier, Mr. Bolt, Mr. Theobald and I visited Creighton Community Schools to see what they are doing to get the results of 1<sup>st</sup> in Science, 2<sup>nd</sup> in Reading and Math last year on the Nebraska State Assessments (NeSA) overall in grades 3-11.

There weren't major differences between Creighton and Sterling Schools, but a few things that they are doing that could be put in place at Sterling next year. Some ideas we are recommending to do here at Sterling as a result of our visit include to increase the Title I services for our students and to put sixth grade back into the elementary. Creighton departmentalizes the middle grades 4-5-6. One teacher teaches all the language arts and reading, one teaches all the science and another teaches all the math. Their teachers use more practicing of testing of the standards that are in the NeSA tests and they have incentives for doing well on these tests.

Additional differences include their eligibility requirements which include a week of probation where students failing one class or more must report to their teachers for 30 minutes after school to work on that class. If after a week of probation they are still failing that subject or if the student is failing more than one subject area they are not eligible.

Creighton has the graduation requirements includes 20 community service hours or 5 per year and the students receive credit for PE if out for sports 2.5 credits per full sport season to accumulate to 10 credits.

### Creighton's Policy on Absenteeism and Reduction in Credit per Semester:

0-5 classes missed	5 credits	6-8 classes missed	4 credits
9-11 classes missed	3 credits	12-14 classed missed	2 credits
15+ classes missed	0 credit	These credits pertain to	high school only.

Creighton junior high students who have 12 or more absences in a school year are subject to being deprived of promotion to the next grade.

### **Alert Solutions**

Effective April 1<sup>st</sup> the school will replace the current system called School Reach with a new system called Alert Solutions. This will be the new company to reach out and inform parents on the telephone, text or email about school related information. There will be more that the teachers and coaches can use to communicate with parents.

### **Carolyn Eilers is Retiring**

Mrs. Eilers is retiring at the end of the school year. She has been teaching at Sterling Public Schools for 46 years! Congratulations Mrs. Eilers and thank you for your years of service to our students!

### **PreSchool Grant**

There is a good chance that Sterling PreSchool will be full-time next school year and the announcement hopefully will be made by April 15<sup>th</sup>. This would mean that those kids who turn 3 by July 31 2014 would be eligible to attend the Sterling PreSchool starting next August 13<sup>th</sup>.

### Sterling Public Schools Offering All Day PreSchool Next Year

At a special meeting on April 1<sup>st</sup>, the Sterling Board of Education approved a plan to offer all day preschool starting with the 2014-15 School Year.

Parents of 3 and 4 year olds will be offered this State approved educational program at Sterling and the school day will be the same as for the K-6 elementary students. Parents living in the district will be offered this first and if there is still room, option students will be accepted.

# Fifth Grade Enjoys Learning

The fifth grade started a new unit in Science on electricity. Their first experiment was observing what happens as charges move from one object to another. They rubbed a balloon on someone's clean, dry hair. They had a great time, especially using Ms. Kate as their project. As you can see, Treyton was having a great time. They learned as they rubbed, electrons break away from your hair. The surface that loses electrons now has a positive charge. They are on the balloon. The balloon now has more electrons, which gives it a negative charge. Because opposite charges attract, the balloon will stick to your hair. They also found if you place the balloons near each other, there is a small force that pushes the balloons apart. This occurs because like charges repel. The flow of charges between the balloon and your hair is an example of electricity.

They are also preparing for the NeSA tests. They have been reviewing and learning new material in all subjects. They will also be taking their annual Safety Day field trip to Tecumseh, on May 1<sup>st</sup>.

This year has gone really fast. This group of students has made it a fun year of learning!!!!
