## Pre-School and Pre-Kindergarten Will Be Full Time in 2014-15

The Sterling preschool and prekindergarten will be full time five days a week with the same school day as the elementary. Ms. Jenna Garton has been hired to replace Mrs. Eilers, who is retiring after 46 years!
At their May meeting the State School Board is expected to approve the Sterling Pre-School Expansion Grant application. This funding will be $\$ 60,000$ per year for three years and will allow the
 school to offer this expanded program to 3 and 4 year olds. Space will be limited, so resident students will be given first priority with option students allowed if room is still available. Please spread this message and contact me ASAP.
Ms. Garton is a graduate of Beatrice High School and Peru State College. She did her student teaching at Lincoln Elementary in Beatrice the fall of 2011. Jenna graduated from Peru State College in December 2011. In addition to her student teaching experience, she has been an infant room teacher in Mitchell. SD; a nanny in College Station. TX; an instructor for SCC's summer camps in Beatrice; and a substitute teacher
 in the area schools. Jenna recently moved back to the area and is excited to call Nebraska home once again!

## Air Quality Project

The Board of Education approved making some much needed improvements to the air quality of the school. Code calls for 15 cubic feet per minute (cfm) of outside air per person, the minimum for school classrooms, as established by the American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air-Conditioning Engineers. The original design for the 2005 High School Building called for a larger unit for the fresh air intake system. This project will increase the size of the fresh air unit which will increase the amount of fresh air that is needed for both the elementary and the high school, cool/dehumidify or heat this fresh air. Reducing the humidity will lower the risk of mold establishment and will make the classrooms more comfortable for students and staff. This unit will reduce the cycle run times of existing heat pumps in classrooms and thereby extending their life. This increase in fresh air quantity will then meet code.

This project also updates the heating equipment for the gym, locker rooms, kitchen and cafeteria. The current boiler is $35+$ years old and will be replaced with a more efficient and reliable new dual boiler system. To complete the fresh air requirements for the gym, locker rooms, kitchen and cafeteria a new duct system with fresh air intake in the gym will be installed. This new fresh air unit will provide air conditioning in the gymnasium and complete the entire building to establish a positive pressurization to not allow the infiltration of unconditioned outdoor air!

This summer is the time to do this project to take advantage of near record low interest rates and the cost can to be spread economically over 10 years. The new equipment has 20-30 year expected useful life.

## $6^{\text {th }}$ Grade Moving Back to Elementary

The $6^{\text {th }}$ grade will be moving into the Elementary next fall. Plans are underway to departmentalize the $4^{\text {th }}, 5^{\text {th }}$ and $6^{\text {th }}$ grades with Mr. Matt Markowski, Mrs. Kate Agena and Mr. Luke Boldt.

## Title One Program

The K-6 elementary students will be getting extra assistance from the Title One Program next fall in the areas of reading and math. Teresa Trauernicht will be in charge of this program and will be getting help part time from Allison Zwygart, Jodi Krause and Karla Daehling.

## Special Education Program

The special education program will be under the direction of Jodi Krause for K-6 and Sandy Weyers for $7-12$. The para professionals who will be assisting them continue to be Trudy Hunt, DeeDee Phillips, Janet Heusman and Renae Kinney.

Rebecca Williams of Sterling, sponsored by the Sterling Women's Auxiliary will join other high school juniors from across Nebraska participating in the American Legion Cornhusker Girl's State, June 1-7, 2014, at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln Sandoz Residence Hall.

Becky is a junior at Sterling Public Schools. She is involved in band, vocal music, SkillsUSA, competitive speech, volleyball, basketball, track, and National Honor Society. She has been a consistent Honor Roll student through her junior high and high school years. She is a member of St. Mary's Catholic of St. Mary, Nebraska. She is the daughter of Jim and Susan Williams of Sterling.

The American Legion Auxiliary developed a citizenship training program based on the formation of the American Legion's Boys State program. This program offers training in the positive processes of self-government and good citizenship as practiced in democratic societies.
Girls State began as one and two day sessions in the late 1930's. In 1939, Girls State was altered to make it a week-long government education program. Since 1948, it has been a regular part of the Auxiliary's Americanism curriculum.

The program is funded by the American Legion Auxiliary with some additional support coming from other civic and non-profit organizations. Little or no expense is required of the delegates and her family.

Each summer approximately 25,000 young women participate in Girls State sessions across the nation. At Girls State, the delegates study local, county, and state government. The girls do this by setting up their own miniature city, county, and state governments and administer them according to the rules and procedures set by Nebraska's laws.

After arriving at Cornhusker Girls State, the citizens are divided into 12 towns named after the Presidents of the United States. The citizens are also divided into two political parties -- the Federalists and the Nationalists. These parties do not reflect the two major political parties in today's system of government. The parties allow citizens to gain knowledge of how a two-party system operates.

Girls State citizens participate in these mock political parties and elections are held to fill city, county, and state positions. Other activities include legislative sessions, campaigning, party rallies, mock trials, and debating. The citizens also receive instruction in Parliamentary Procedure.
