#### Superintendent's Message: by Mrs. Dottie Heusman

As we enter the month of February I am hoping for great weather. Having to predict the weather has NOT been one of the superintendent duties that I love! However, I am enjoying the new challenges that come with this position. I have gotten to know a lot of the students, parents and staff members. Sterling really is a great place to be!

The Preschool Building is nearing completion. We will have an Open House to coincide with Parent/Teacher Conferences on Thursday, February 8 from 6:00-8:00. The Board of Education chose to proceed with this project to assure the children in our school district were given every opportunity to be successful in life. Researchers have studied the long-term effects of an Early Childhood Program. What they have found supports the benefits of these programs. Here are some examples:

- Children who participated in early childhood programs had higher test scores and less grade retention.
- By the age of 35 students that had participated in early childhood programs had better health, which included lower blood pressure and lower drug use. Women had better employment.
- All day programs allow mothers and fathers to continue their education and enter the workforce in order to support their families in the future or right away.
- High-quality programs, like the program at Sterling Public Schools, focus on the whole child, not just academic learning. Children learn social skills and are able to function in society.
- Children are provided a healthy lunch and milk at snack time assuring they are getting good nutritional opportunities for growth. This is critical for their brain and body development.

These are just some of the findings that support a high quality program. Sterling has worked diligently to provide great opportunities for kids and will continue to do so in the future. We could not do this without the support of the community. Remember it takes a village to raise a child! Thanks for all YOU do too!

#### **Board of Education News:**

At the December Regular Board Meeting the Board heard a presentation from Jeff DeLine from Dana Cole Company in regards to the 2016-2017 audit. They approved on second reading board policies 8260-Conflict of Interest, 8342-Board Meetings, 3003—Bidding for Construction, Remodeling, Repair or Site Improvement, and Board Policy 3045—Use of Sniffer Dogs. They approved the purchase of carpet and tile from Floors, Inc. for the Preschool Building. Our maintenance personnel will install this. Superintendent Heusman's evaluation was also shared and discussed.

The Board met on January 3 for a Board Workshop. Topics that were discussed included; ways to market the district, a before and after school program, facility review, and five year planning in regards to big ticket items.

One area the board focused on was the message that is sometimes heard in the public about Sterling Public Schools closing. They reviewed information from area schools in regards to tax levies and operations. Sterling is doing an excellent job of managing tax dollars while still providing a quality education for all students, PK-12. Some of the items discussed were:

- **Opportunities**. Sterling continues to offer various opportunities for students from an all day Pre-K Program for three and four year olds to clubs and activities at the high school level. Many students at SPS are involved in multiple activities which help make them a more rounded individual!
- High test scores. Check out the District Report card as well as the comparison chart in this mailing. Sterling students are achieving at high levels.
- **Bonds**. Currently only one building bond is being paid off and at this time there are no plans to ask for another bond for building purposes.
- **Housing**. As you drive through the communities of Sterling and Douglas there are few empty houses. At least once every couple of weeks the school receives an inquiry from someone looking for a house to rent or buy. People want to live in our communities and they want their kids to go to the local school! Small Town Big Heart!
- Graduation rates. Staff pride themselves in caring about each kid. We do whatever is needed to meet students to help them be successful until they graduate from SPS!

The Board met on January 15 for their regularly scheduled meeting. Officers were elected; John Harms-President, Mike Hestermann-Vice President, Cheri Wirthele-Secretary, and Rick Vollman-Treasurer. Other members of the board are Lois Agena and Mark Parde. The Tecumseh Chieftain and the Voice Newspaper were approved as legal newspapers for the district. First Bank of Nebraska-Sterling Branch was approved as the financial depository. The board approved board policy 5006 Option Enrollment Capacity. The board also accepted the resignation of Mr. Chris Salberg, Industrial Technology Teacher, at the end of the 2017-2018 school year. Mr. Salberg is retiring.

The next regularly scheduled board meeting will be held on Monday, February 19, 2018 @ 7:30 in the Media Center at Sterling Public Schools.

#### Parent/Community Involvement In Schools

According to a report from the Southwest Educational Development Laboratory in 2002, "When schools, families, and community groups work together to support learning, children tend to do better in school, stay in school longer, and like school more". We would like to thank all of those community associations and businesses that help support our students throughout the year. Our attendance during the fall parent-teacher conferences in the MS/HS was around 74%, while the elementary parent attendance was around 88%. These are both high percentages which is fantastic and we greatly appreciate those who came in, but it also leaves some room for improvement. With the availability of grades on PowerSchool and teachers through their email, it is easier for parents to check in with their students online. However, there can always be more to learn and discuss in a face-to-face conversation. Please do not ever hesitate to contact your teacher or myself to come in and visit about your student. We are here to serve you and your student and we feel the more involved you can be, the more likely it is that your student will be successful in their educational and life experiences. Remember that spring parent-teacher conferences are scheduled for February 8th. We hope to see you there!

#### **1-World Initiative**

The use of technology as a tool to increase student learning and engagement has been a very strong passion of mine. As I looked at the exit survey from last year's senior class, the feedback on one question was glaringly low compared to the others. The question asked the graduates if the school provided strong foundation in the use of technology. Nearly 63% of our graduates rated our foundation of technology at average or below average. Nearly every other question was rated at excellent or good for our school. The use of computers and iPads support both teaching and learning, technology infuses classrooms with digital learning tools that expand course offerings, experiences, and learning materials. It also supports learning 24/7, builds 21st century skills, increases student engagement and motivation, and accelerates learning. These are many of the reasons why we are implementing the 1-World Initiative in August of 2018. The 1-World Initiative briefly put is about access. By giving each one of our students a device we are giving them access to the world! Our overall goal is to provide our students with the best access to the most current, scholarly information and most innovative and engaging instructional tools available. We want to give our students the skills they need to be college and career ready so they can be successful when they graduate from Sterling High School. This fall we will be able to move forward with this initiative and give each student 7-12 a laptop. High school students will receive a brand new MacBook Air Laptop to increase the foundation of technology that we are providing for our students. The teachers have already begun to prepare for this move. Stay tuned for more information in the coming months.

#### First Grade News: by Mrs. Hier

The first-grade class celebrated the 100th day of school in January. This important day was filled with activities using the number 100 including an autograph book, 100-piece snack, and building words with letters.

The first-grade class has been writing everyday using our new writing curriculum developed by Lucy Calkins. Each day a mini-lesson is presented to encourage young writers to use a variety of strategies when writing. Our first graders are becoming quite skilled at writing. They enjoy being peer coaches and helping classmates improve their writing.

Our school year started with a new handwriting curriculum which uses multisensory handwriting that is developmentally appropriate for all learning styles. We are able to practice our handwriting on paper and on our new ipads. We have a set of ipads for our classroom that have a variety of apps that can be used throughout the day to enrich learning skills. The first graders enjoy the opportunity to work on skills at their own pace and level.

Our new reading series introduces new reading strategies and skills each week. There are leveled readers that accompany each weekly story. Our class has had fun performing some of the plays. Our fluency in reading and story comprehension continue to improve.

Math has us reading story problems. These stories involve knowing when to add, subtract, and even how to convert coins for stories involving money. We are currently adding and subtracting numbers to twenty.

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## What's New in Technology...

with Mr. Davenport

"Our students' current comfort level challenge the students in new ways."

In an era of smartphones, Roombas, drones, voice command, and online shopping, society has become accustomed to having everything on demand through the use of technology. We no longer have to wait for a newspaper to find out what is going on in the world today or visit a library to find out what happened in the world years ago. More information than we ever knew we wanted is almost always available within arm's reach.

At Sterling, the teachers have recognized the changing world and have begun to adapt what we are teaching our students as well as how we are getting the information to them. While personal electronic devices can be a hindrance to a student's education at times, they can also be a powerful tool in the classroom and at home to enhance education. The current generation of students at Sterling are no strangers to the use of computers for research or as a presentation method. Our students' current comfort level has allowed us, as teachers, to challenge the students in new ways.

Much of our professional development over the course of the last year has been focused on implementing the use of technology into our classrooms to enhance the students' exposure and comprehension. The teachers throughout the elementary and high school are now using tools like Google Classroom to make class material available at school, at home, or on the go. A majority of our teachers are now also providing other technology based learning opportunities to the students including, but not limited to, fully online courses, academic games, and options to explore the limitless technology based presentation methods to demonstrate their knowledge.

Lack of devices may have been a limiting factor in the use of technology in the past, but that problem is being alleviated throughout our school. The devices currently being offered for our students include personal computers operating on both Windows and Mac systems, iPads, and Chromebooks. The diverse range of technology allows the students to become efficient across multiple platforms and inevitably, better prepared for life after graduation.

To further lessen the gap between number of students and the number of devices, every student in the high school will be issued a MacBook Air laptop at the beginning of the next school year. This 1:1 move (one device per student) will open up a world of opportunities for the high school students and free up more devices throughout elementary and junior high school. Going 1:1 will expand the reach of the traditional classroom and allow students to deepen their knowledge at their own pace or explore information past the limitations of class time. Coupling the new devices with the sharing properties of most devices and online programs will also allow students to collaborate with classmates outside of the classroom. By empowering the students through technology, their learning does not have to end at the bell.
