#### **PURPOSE**

The administration, faculty, and staff are pleased to present the Annual Report to the patrons of Sterling Public School district. This report is designed to provide you with important information regarding the academic and financial operations of the school district.

#### SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT GOALS

All students K-12th will improve their writing skills. All students K-12th will improve their reading comprehension. All preschool students will improve their gross motor skills.

The district will also work to ensure that students have an opportunity to acquire the necessary knowledge and skills to be successful, to use this knowledge and skills in a variety of settings, and to stretch students abilities through problem solving situations that require students to develop and hone their critical thinking skills.

#### THE DISTRICT

Sterling Public Schools is located 35 miles Southeast of Lincoln, Nebraska, in Northwest Johnson County. It is a small town with a big heart. Sterling is the 2nd biggest community in Johnson county and is one of the most prosperous agricultural districts in the country. Approximately 224 students are served by a single PK-12 attendance center located in the village of Sterling. We currently have 21 teachers on staff (10.7:1 student/teacher ratio) and 18 non-classified staff members that provide support throughout the school year. Sterling Public Schools offer a wide range of sports and activities for all students. We offer volleyball, football, basketball, track, One Act Play, band, choir, Trap Shooting, cheerleading, FBLA, FFA, National Honor Society, and Student Council.

This school year (2023-2024) our staff has made a concerted effort to build improve our teaching and learning. Our professional development is working in Professional Learning Communities (P.L.C.) reading educational books to improve our crafts. The books we are reading are:

- Grading From the Inside Out
- Explicit Instruction
- Culturize
- Know Better, Do Better

The Multi-tiered Support System (MTSS) has allowed us to identify struggling students and provide them the necessary interventions to be successful. The Nebraska Department of Education classified Sterling Public Schools a "Great," school district based on the Nebraska School Tenets and standardized test scores. This is an improvement from previous years. We

will continue to focus on our Reading and Writing, due to the low percentage of students who are proficient in those areas.

We installed numerous cameras around the facility and changed the locks to all the classroom doors. We purchased these with a grant through Nebraska Department of Education.

With the use of Perkins funds, we purchased a T-shirt press for our Entrepreneurship class. They are currently working on the machine and hope to have shirts out in the Spring of '25.

Future Plans: We are constantly reviewing curriculums to improve our reading and math foundational skills. We will be researching different reading curriculums this year and implementing that curriculum in a year. We have visited with architects to discuss a future renovation of the cafeteria, kitchen, commons area, and classrooms. CMBA has developed some preliminary plans for the board to review in hopes to expand our campus. The cafeteria and kitchen are going to need attention in the near future. The architects also discovered our elementary classrooms are almost 200 sq. ft. too small for our class sizes.

The Elementary classes are currently starting a fundraiser to purchase new playground equipment. The old playground is out dated and we cannot get replacement parts.
